## Message from the Rector

#### "Repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." St. Matthew 3:2

Repent: to turn away, to be converted. That is the crux of the message proclaimed by both John the Baptist and by our Lord Jesus Christ himself. Repent: turn away, be converted.

About a year ago I received an advertising email from TAN Books and Publishers, and attached to it was an article entitled "Pious Practices for Lent." In this article were outlined various Lenten disciplines and a few brief examples of each. For instance, under the heading "Abstinence" was a list of things people often give up during Lent: meat, sweets, dessert, gum, coffee, alcohol, eating between meals, smoking(!), and so forth. Of course, we twenty-first century Christians can add our own unique things to that list: television, the internet, movies, video games, and a host of other technological distractions.

Another "pious practice" reviewed was the practice of prayer. We can (and should!) increase the time we spend in prayer during the forty days of Lent. Those who pray some form of the Rosary can increase its use. We can be more conscious of assisting at the Holy Eucharist on Sundays and during the Holy Days that fall during Lent. We can engage in a "Holy Hour" where we do nothing but rest in silence before our Lord and contemplate him. And, of course, we can also increase the intercessions we make for our families, our friends, our neighbors, and for the world as a whole, especially those suffering in the world.

And finally, there are the disciplines of engagement that should take up a bit more of our time during the forty days of Lent. We should be more conscious about performing certain works of mercy: visiting the sick, the lonely, and our shut-ins. We should increase our giving of alms. We should become more involved in evangelism. And finally, we should engage in good spiritual reading, the kind of reading that leads to the nurture and growth of our spiritual lives.

The result of all these things is repentance or our ongoing conversion; a life of deeper dedication and devotion, more fully consecrated to God. The goal, of course, is to become more and more like Jesus in our everyday walk of life.

But this life of deeper dedication and consecration does not occur without a bit of effort on our part. We must combine our efforts with God's grace to assist him in bringing this conversion about. It is often a slow and difficult process, but one that is essential to our growth in grace and in Christ-likeness.

Repent: turn away, be converted. Become like Jesus: we were born (again!) for nothing less.

I wish each and every one of you a blessed and fruitful Lent.

## Music Notes Kathleen Knott, Music Director

Our 1940 Hymnal provides the foundation for much of our music. If you look at the hymnal you will note that the first part of the book is organized according to the Church year. Hymns for Advent, Epiphany, Lent, Passiontide, and Easter make up the first 100 hymns in our repertoire. This rich heritage of Christian hymnody ranges from plainsong to four part harmony. The hymn tunes range in age from Medieval times to examples by 20<sup>th</sup> century composers. The tune origins are both sacred and secular. Our most beloved passion hymn (#75, O Sacred Head Sore Wounded) is an example of a tune taken from a secular love song. While joining in the singing of our great heritage of hymns, please take a moment to notice the source of the tune and the text.

As the liturgical year moves from Epiphany through Lent to the season of Easter, St Mark's Choir will be busy preparing music for Sundays and special services. Each choir member is dedicated to his or her ministry at St Mark's. We practice every Wednesday evening and Sunday morning. If you like to sing, please consider joining in this ministry in which we seek to enhance worship through music.

### Parish Needs

Occasionally we are asked about parish needs and about how one might give certain appointments as memorial gifts. One need that we never seem to notice until we change the Altar and clergy vestments to the color of the season are the purple set we use during Lent and the green set we use during the Trinity season. Both sets are very old and are wearing very, very thin. As a matter of fact, the church has only Altar vestments in purple. The priests Vestments belong to Fr. Mike. It is customary, however, for a parish church to have its own full set in each of the seasonal colors.

If you would like to consider giving a full set of either the purple or green, please contact either Michelle

Cook or Melvena Grice of the Altar Guild. A full set (Altar frontal, burse, veil, lectern fall, pulpit fall, priest's chasuble, maniple, and stole) costs about \$3,500 and may have a memorial inscription placed inside.
